

Washington Village Demolition & Reconstruction

Three Phases of Construction

273 Apartments

- 136 Replacement Public Housing Units (one-for-one replacement)
- 67 Moderate Income Rental Units (60% AMI)
- 70 Market Rate Rental Units

Two Phases of Demolition

136 Apartments

- Phase I 5 Buildings, 54 Apartments
- Phase II 6 Buildings, 82 Apartments plus a Community Building

Phase I Construction

Phase I Construction at the13 & 20 Day Street Properties will provide 80 new apartments

Projected completion: 3/31/2018

- 40 Replacement Public Housing Units
- 18 Moderate Income Housing Units (60% of AMI)
- 22 Market Rate Units
- Construction Budget \$44 million

Phase II Construction

- Phase II Construction on half of the existing Washington Village property will provide 85 new apartments
- Projected Completion: 9/30/2019
 - 41 Replacement Public Housing Units
 - 21 Moderate Income Housing Units (60% of AMI)
 - 23 Market Rate Units
- Estimated Construction Cost \$48 million

Phase III Construction

- Phase III Construction on half of the existing Washington Village property will provide 108 new apartments
- Projected Completion: 3/31/2021
 - 55 Replacement Public Housing Units
 - 28 Moderate Income Housing Units (60% of AMI)
 - 25 Market Rate Units




Public Infrastructure

- Objectives
 - Address Floodplain Issues and Drainage
 - Improve Severe Storm Resiliency for Utilities
 - Create an attractive streetscape by eliminating overhead wiring and utility poles
 - Planned Improvements
 - Elevate the intersection of Raymond & Day Street approx. Five feet
 - Replace public water main and increase capacity
 - Replace existing gas main and increase capacity
 - Relocate overhead power and telecommunication lines underground
 - Install stormproof vaults for transformers
 - Extend Day Street Past Hanford Place and connect to Elizabeth Street
- Estimated Cost: \$9.5 Million

Choice Neighborhoods Initiative Education: Pre-school to High School









Goals

- Children Enter Kindergarten ready to learn
- Children are at Grade level reading by Third grade
- Youth have strong assets to be successful in school and life

Washington Village youth demographics:

- 18 Preschoolers
- 43 Elementary students (Kindergarten through 5th grade)
- 24 Middle School students (6th to 8th grade)
- 8 High School students (9th to 12th grade)
- 6 Post-secondary students (college, vocational training)



Education

The CNI Education Initiative is under the umbrella of Norwalk ACTS, which includes a network of over 45 education organizations and stakeholders that collaborate to deliver a continuum of educational opportunities from cradle to career.

- As a member of Norwalk ACTS, the Norwalk Housing Authority has assumed the lead in the implementation of the education plan and works closely with the Norwalk Public Schools and other education resources in the community.
- NHA has a data sharing agreement with Norwalk Public Schools.



Education (continued)

The full continuum of educational supports that NHA provides to the Washington Village youth include:

- A. Early Childhood outreach and linkage to early childhood resources within the community.
- **B.** Educational programs that provide:
 - After School learning center onsite at Washington Village for students K-5th grade
 - Bridge to College and Career program located at 20 West for 6th through 12th graders, with a specific high school track
 - Scholarship program that provides post-secondary students financial assistance and support

Assessment Tools

- PELI a preschool literacy assessment (3 & 4 year olds)
- mCLASS DIEBELS individual measures of basic early literacy skills (K 3rd grade)
- NEWEA MAP measures of academic progress (4th 10th grade)

PELI

Note: This data includes 12 out of 18 preschoolers

- 5 preschoolers were at or above benchmark
- 4 preschoolers were below benchmark
- 3 preschoolers were well below benchmark



Assessment and Data Points (continued)

mClass DIBELS (at start of 2016-17 school year)

Note: this data only includes K, 1st and 2nd graders (23 students)

- 13 students are at benchmark
- 3 students are at below benchmark
- 7 students are at well-below benchmark

NWEA DATA (at start of 2016-17 school year)

Note: this data includes 4th – 10th graders (30 students)

- 9 students are at benchmark
- 9 students are below benchmark
- 12 students well below benchmark

Education Outreach

- The Education Coordinator is involved in the following outreach activities that are both formal and informal connections:
 - Direct contact with schools around student needs as evidenced by involvement in parent teacher meetings, inviting school personnel to visit our learning center and talk with parents and students, meetings with students and parents around concerns and need for additional resources.
 - Active member of Norwalk ACTS which provides engagement in the different community action networks around education, the education coordinator as well as other NHA education staff are involved.
 - Involved in school based councils that specifically address issues and concerns. This affords a closer partnership with school personnel at the specific schools that Washington Village students are enrolled.
 - Does outreach to pre-school parents and pre-school programs to assess enrollment and opportunity.



Education Outreach (continued)

- Active member of Norwalk READS and works on book distribution for our public housing community including Washington Village.
- Works closely with NHA Bridge to College and other community programs around resources and support for the 6th to12th grade students residing in Washington Village.
- Does outreach to community resources and brings them into the Washington Village community.





Middle School Student Profile

- 8 grader at West Rocks Middle School
- Family Composition: Single family Household with two older brothers
- Issues: Student is currently failing all academic subjects (Math, English, and Science)
- Interventions: Provide tokens for student to stay after school for extra tutorial support, work closely with West Rocks and parent to support student.
- Strategies: In school lunch detention, and making it mandatory that student stays afterschool for extra tutorial support
- Challenges: Provide student with a personal qualified tutor

High School Student profile

- 11th grader at Norwalk High School
- Family Composition: Two parent working family household with a younger brother
- Interest: Going to college for fashion marketing and track (100 meter dash and hurdles)
- Linkages: Norwalk Housing Scholarship Foundation, youth credit workshop, free SAT classes, School of Visual Arts (SUV), and college planning workshops
- Challenges: Personal track coach at students request






Case Management Enrollment

Adults Pursuing Advanced Education





Common Employment Barriers

- Lack of reliable transportation
- Limited English Language skills
- Low wage jobs hinder advancement opportunities
- High rates of chronic health issues including high blood pressure and diabetes

Impacts the overall health and well-being of the family



Employment Services

- CNI Self Sufficiency Fund: Driver's License, computers and specialized training
- Connect Residents to Norwalk Public School for ESL
- Bring employers to residents via the JOB CLUB
- Engage employers in open discussions and create access to employment opportunities through the EMPLOYER ADVISORY BOARD
- Encourage residents to pursue specialized training that will result in IN-DEMAND careers



HUD/NHA Family Self-Sufficiency Program


Requirement: Head of household **MUST** be employed at end of 5 years

- Total # Public Housing Households enrolled: 62
- Total # Washington Village Households enrolled: 27 (43% of total)
- Total # Washington Village Households recruited in 2015-16 (HOU/FSS Referrals): 24
- Of the 27 with escrows, values range from a few dollars to \$10,000
- Total Escrow of all 27 WV households: \$23,920



Health and Wellness

Via 2016 survey, adults reported the following health conditions:







Health and Wellness (continued)



With Every Heartbeat is Life

- 3 month self-monitoring blood pressure program
- Nutrition and health education workshops
- Community Health Worker helps with outreach to the Washington Village community



Health and Wellness (continued)



- 29 completed initial workshop and went on to enroll in wellness program
- 26 maintained program guidelines throughout duration
 - 13 (50%) are Washington Village residents
- Initial blood Pressure average: 140/101hg

Results:

14 reduced their heart disease mortality by average of 9% and reduced their stroke mortality by 14%




